Time for old-fashioned fun!

Excitement is in the air in Armada as the 146th annual Armada Fair will be taking place Aug. 13-19.

The headlining musical act for the fair is the country music trio Midland which will perform in the grandstand at 8:30 p.m. on opening day, Monday Aug. 13.

"We're super excited about that," said Armada Fair office manager Mary Straubel.

Based out of Dripping Springs, Texas, and named after the Dwight Yoakam song "Fair to Midland", the trio consists of singer Mark Wystrach, lead guitarist Jess Carson and bass player Cameron Duddy.

Midland is the embodiment of Seventies California Country, all smooth Eagles harmonies and heart-on-your-sleeve lyrics. Their songs are intoxicating, sung with the twang of George Strait. They released a self-titled EP in 2016 and a full length album "On the Rocks" last year.

"On the Rocks" has three charted singles:

"Drinkin' Problem," "Make a Little" and "Burn Out."

They won New Vocal Duo or Group of the Year at the 2018 ACM Awards.

"Drinkin' Problem" received two Grammy nominations for Best Country Duo/Group Performance and Best Country Song.

Danielle Bradbery will open for Midland at 8 p.m.

She is the winner of season four of "The Voice". Her latest album is "I Don't Believe We've Met", and includes the singles "Sway" and "Worth It".

The concert is free with fair admission. VIP Infield armbands are \$10 and the infield is standing room only.

Big Rock Amusements will provide numerous midway rides and games, with daily and weekly armbands being offered.

Crowd favorites such as the Bump and Run, the Demolition Derby, the Figure Eight Race, and the Tractor and Truck Pulls are returning.

"On Saturday night the (tractor and truck) lineup

is going to be a big power event; the big tractors, the big trucks, the big smokers, the big loud engines. It should be a big draw this year," Straubel said.

The Super Kicker Rodeo will be at the Armada Fair at 7 p.m., on Friday Aug. 17 and it will feature bull riding, bareback riding, bronco riding, barrel racing, and team roping. Free with paid fair admission.

There will plenty of events for kids as well, including a Power Wheel Race on August 16, workshops provided by the Detroit Institute of Arts, daily pedal pulls, and daily eating contests.

Advance tickets for the Armada Fair are \$8 for adults, \$2 for children nine to 12 and free for children eight and under. Tickets at the gate are \$10 for adults, \$2 for children nine to 12 and free for children eight and under.

August 14 is Military Appreciation Day, with free admission with valid military ID.



WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP **Paving project moves** full speed ahead

Washington Township motorists using 30 Mile and Jewell roads may just rejoice in a few months.

The Macomb County Department of Roads has added the long-proposed paving project to the new Total Sports Park near the top of its list this summer.

"The orange barrels are already showing up," said Washington Township Supervisor Dan O'Leary.

The county plans on paving the Stretch of 30 Mile Road from M-53 to Powell Road.

In addition, the county will pave Powell Road north from 30 Mile Road to the township's future sewer plant, just north of Powell Cemetery.

The total cost of the project is projected at \$1,969,689 according to the Department of Roads.

"As with similar road projects, there will be some tree removal on the county's right of way. Property owners should contact the department of roads," O'Leary said.

The project will take two to three months to complete and motorists may

experience road closures.

O'Leary told the Washington Township Board of Trustees at their Aug. 1 meeting that he was disappointed that the county will not be improving the intersection of 30 Mile and Powell roads with extra turn lanes and a better alignment.

"I would like to get that intersection fixed but it has taken us two years to get this project approved," he said.

The township and the county had decided to delay the project in prior years because paving bids were higher than expected.

The township board approved a motion that would allow visitors to Total Sports Park to use an easement through township-owned property to drive to the parking lot while road construction is underway. O'Leary said it's the same easement used by visitors to the Trump rally in April.

The board also approved temporarily leasing township-owned land to the Department of Roads to store equipment and to lease township-owned property to Total Sports for storage because a portion of their property will not be accessible during construction.

Perseids Meteor Shower parties planned

Look up in the sky! Is it a bird? Is it a plane? No, it's meteors!

The annual Perseids Meteor Shower will be at its peak this weekend with spectators seeing about 60-70 meteors per hour, but in outburst years (such as in 2016) the rate can be between 150-200 meteors an hour.


"This year the moon will be near new moon, it will be a crescent, which means it will set before the Perseid show gets underway after midnight," said NASA meteor expert Bill Cooke. "The moon is very favorable for the Perseids this year, and that'll make the Perseids probably the best shower of 2018 for people who want to go out and view it."

According to Cooke, the Perseids are rich in fireballs, so the show should be even better.

Three viewing parties have been organized at area parks for this weekend:

- Bald Mountain State Recreation Area in Oakland Township is one of dozens of Michigan State Parks and Recreation Areas hosting viewing parties from 10 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. Even if it is cloudy, the park will have educational materials and a bonfire on the beach. S'mores and materials will be provided. Park officials recommend dressing for the weather and recommend bringing blankets or lounging chairs for viewing. Please RSVP by calling the park.
- The Stony Creek Metropark Nature Center in Washington Township is hosting a viewing party beginning at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday,

Washington Township man accused of stabbing and beating girlfriend

A 35 year-old Washington Township man accused of allegedly beating and stabbing his 22 year-old livein girlfriend is scheduled to appear in 42-1 Romeo District Court at 1:30 p.m., Tuesday, Aug. 14 for a pretrial hearing.

Paul Bashi was arraigned last week on charges of one count of assault with intent to murder which is a life felony.

Bashi was also charged with one count of processing a controlled substance - "Jintropin" - which is a seven year felony. Jintropin is a human growth hormone.

Bashi is being held under a \$5 million bond at the Macomb County Jail.

The Macomb County Sheriff's office said that Bashi was arrested after deputies responded to a 911 call for an assault at 7 p.m., on Sunday, July 29 on Cathey Ave. in Washington Township.

left the residence in a vehicle and that a second person was lying on the porch.

Upon arrival, deputies found a white female victim lying on the porch. She was injured and bleeding from multiple puncture wounds to her head and right side of her body. The female was transported to the hospital for treatment.

Bashi was located walking down a nearby street with what appeared to be blood on him according to deputies. The deputies took Bashi into custody.

The sheriff's office said the victim is in stable condition at this time and recovering from her wounds at a hospital.

Deputies reported that the woman could have been stabbed as many as two dozen times. The sheriff's department has also confirmed to media outlets that video surveillance retrieved from the home shows Bashi allegedly punching the victim approximately 50 times and kicking her 100 times.

Scientists believe the meteor shower has occurred for at least the last 1,000 years.

Macomb County Public Works Commissioner Candice S. Miller is asking the Michigan Attorneys General Bill Schuette to investigate more than \$500,000 in contracts awarded by her predecessor from 2011 through 2014.

Specifically Miller is asking for Schuette to look into contracts involving Giffels-Webster Engineering and one or more individuals who have since pleaded guilty or were otherwise involved in the ongoing federal public corruption investigation that the FBI is conducting in and around Macomb County.

At a press conference on Aug. 1, Miller stressed that while projects were in fact completed under the contracts, given recent court testimony and convictions, it would be irresponsible not to have the attorneys general scrutinize the contracts to ensure that no public monies were misdirected.

According to Miller, current executives of Giffels-Webster recently approached her and highlighted concerns about the billings of Giffels-Webster to the Macomb County Public Works Office during the tenure of Paulin Modi, a former Giffels-Webster engineer who oversaw the projects.

Modi has since pleaded guilty in court and was sentenced for his role in the public corruption scandal.

Paulin Modi of Troy, 48, was found guilty on one count of conspiracy to commit of bribery before Judge Robert H. Cleland in U.S. District Court in Port Huron last year.

Federal prosecutors said Modi paid an unnamed township official \$1,000 in cash in May 2014 to maintain an existing contract Modi's engineering firm, Giffels Webster, had with the township.

Miller said that between 2011 and 2014, state grants and a state loan

funded the majority of projects administered by Macomb County Public Works Office that were awarded to Giffels-Webster.

In the contracts in question, Giffels-Webster utilized a private company owned by Carlo Santia as a subcontractor.

Santia recently testified in court that this same private company intentionally overcharged Giffels-Webster in order to secure funds Santia then used to reimburse Modi for bribes paid to Dean Reynolds, who was then an elected trustee in Clinton Township.

Three of the five MCPWO contracts in question were executed during the time that Jim Pistilli was the chief engineer at the Macomb County Public Works Office.

Pistilli left the public works office in June 2012 and joined Giffels-Webster in October 2012.

Pistilli pled guilty Sept. 27 to his part in bribing a Washington Township official.

Miller said that in question are five different projects, all related to inspections and improvements conducted on public works property, facilities or equipment.

According to Miller, the projects involved \$386,234 in Michigan Storm water, Asset management and Wastewater grants, a \$43,802 state loan made to the MCPWO and \$87,080 in funds from the public works office.

"All of this raises questions that can only be answered by an investigation and I am asking the Attorney General to do just that," Miller said.

Miller made initial contact with Schuette on July 30 and her office is in the process of providing financial documents on the contracts in question to the Attorney General's Office.

OCTOBER 4 ISSUE ANSWERS (photo to right): This tool was excavated at the Holcombe Beach site at the intersection of 16 Mile and Dodge Park roads. It is the present location of Heritage Junior High in Sterling Heights. The Paleo-Indian site was occupied about 12,000 years ago when this was the shore line of what is now Lake St. Clair. James E. Fitting, Jerry De Visscher and Edward J. Wahla were instrumental in the discovery and excavation with the University of Michigan. The Paleo-Indians were a nomadic group and are usually considered to be the first American-Indian population in the American continent. Visit the Romeo Archives Tuesday evening and hold this



object yourself. It is like holding a Moon rock, not everyone gets that chance. This was just the first group of Indians to arrive in Macomb County. More to come! —*R. Beringer, Curator*





Media Action Plan

Enough is enough. The time has come for the media to reclaim our role and aggressively cover the Trump administration without the fear. We must disregard the constant bullying by him and his accessories after the "alternative facts," aka flunkies, aka stooges.

Sure, show them in their entirety, but only on a tape-delayed basis, after the networks have had a chance to identify all his lies and exaggerations, and as he spouts them, present the facts on the screen's lower-third.

— Label his tweets as dangerous nonsense when they are: Or ignore them as superficial childish tantrums when they are that.

- Press charges against those who impede Trump coverage: If the local authorities won't cooperate, press federal charges against them.


Also press charges against the president if he incites someone to take illegal action against reporters: True, the criminal charges can't be prosecuted while he's in office, but that won't be forever. In addition, he can be sued.

I realize that each of these bullet points might be shot down as unworkable or revised, but some variation definitely would be better than the timid response we've seen thus far. Otherwise, these assaults against the public's need to know will get worse. Actually, it does every day.

Now the boss man is tweeting that the press is "unpatriotic" and endangering "the lives of many." The only patriotic thing for journalists to do is to get more aggressive with him and his fellow truth molesters. Democracy can survive only with robust media. Neutered news inevitably leads to autocracy.

The Battle Over Socialism Is Joined

It's begun. We are having a debate over socialism.

Not over whether it's fair to call Democrats socialists. Not over whether socialism has been good for Venezuela or some other faraway, unfortunate country. But socialist policies right here in the United States.

The press attention to a new study of the costs of "Medicare for all," or universal health coverage paid for by the government that goes much further than Obamacare, is a sign that it is a live issue.

Popularized by Bernie Sanders, Medicare-for-all is not just a fringy left-wing talking point anymore. It's a plank of a growing element of the Democratic Party. A raft of prospective Democratic presidential candidates has endorsed the policy, while about a third of the Democratic members of the House have joined a caucus devoted to it.

The good news for Sanders and Co. is that, in the wake of the failure of an attempted GOP repeal of Obamacare, the health care debate is clearly moving left. The bad news is that Medicare-for-all is still a completely batty, politically unserious idea.

The new study of its costs, from the conservative Mercatus Center, concludes that Medicare-for-all would increase federal spending by almost \$33 trillion during the first 10 years. The study notes that "it would be less expensive to the federal government to triple all projected appropriations," and that "doubling all currently projected federal individual and corporate income tax collections would be insufficient to finance the added federal costs of the plan.'

Supporters of the idea impeached the credibility of the findings based on their source, yet a study by the centrist Urban Institute in 2016 found exactly the same thing.

The costs aren't merely a theoretical matter. Vermont, the home of Bernie Sanders, abandoned a single-payer proposal after the Democratic governor concluded that it wasn't fiscally sustainable. Despite its Democratic supermajorities, California gave up on a single-payer proposal last year for the same reason — the projected cost was twice as much as the state budget.

The upside is that Medicare-for-all purports to save on overall health care spending by ratcheting down payments to health care providers. Medicare does indeed pay less to hospitals than private insurers, but it's not clear that this would be sustainable if hospitals could count on only Medicare-level payments.

Since Medicare-for-all would eliminate insurance premiums and provide health care free of charge, it would create an incentive for more usage, and more health care expenditures.


All of this is why the natural gravity in a single-payer system is toward brute-force price controls and rationing to control costs.

President Barack Obama had to promise that if you like your health care you can keep it because any change to private insurance is so toxic. Medicare-for-all would replace the employer-based system entirely for more than 150 million people. It wouldn't matter how much they liked their insurance — it would be gone as a matter of definition.


Republicans need to continue to develop and push their own ideas to reduce health care costs and adjust to the new reality where socialism doesn't simply represent a laugh line, but a battle that needs to be won.

It was a new year and a new record for the Eastern Michigan State Fair. Gross gate receipt records, newly set in 2017, were surpassed last week during the 2018 event, reports Manager Ian Kempf. "We had another wonderful fair. Last year we hit a high water mark and we surpassed those figures by 10.3 percent this year," Kempf noted. "We had a little bit of rain on Tuesday but the rest of the week was absolutely perfect in terms of weather."

A stray bullet from target practice shooting at a nearby home went through the wall and struck Shirley Pfeil, 73, of Riley Township, on March 25. She collapsed on impact, and later died at the hospital. The shooter-21-year-old Michael Vultaggio of Sterling Heights-eventually pled guilty to careless discharge of a firearm resulting in death, a 2-year felony; and lying to a police officer, a 1-year misdemeanor. Last month, St. Clair County Circuit Court

Judge Daniel Kelly sentenced Vultaggio to three-months in jail with work release privileges. He's also banned from ever owning or using firearms for the rest of his life. The family wants the public to know they are in agreement with the sentence. "We realized that whether he gets three months or 3,000 years, it won't bring our mother back. Why destroy another person's life? We asked for leniency," said Pfeil's daughter. Debra Bishop, "If my mother could have handed him a sentence, that's what she would have done."

Soave Real Estate Group plans to build a \$20 million luxury condominium complex on Letica Drive in Rochester. The district, zoned RP-research park, does not allow for residential uses, so the development required special project approval from the Rochester City Council. The project passed July 24 in a unanimous vote. Councilman Ben Giovanelli said he feels it's the best use of the site, given the zoning. "Do we want heavy industrial? Do we want chemical? Do we want all this manufacturing going on? ... I would rather have us pick what kind of development we want in that spot, versus an industrial-type thing that would just not complement that area at all," he said. "Given all the alternatives, it's probably the best use of the site."

Plans are underway to expand the roadway at the 23 Mile Road and Shelby Parkway intersection, near M-53, as more industrial development has congested the area with higher traffic volumes. The Michigan Department of Transportation awarded the Macomb County Department of Roads a Transportation Economic Development Fund grant totaling \$1.647 million to cover 60 percent of the project, which is estimated to cost \$2.745 million. Macomb County will pay \$740,500, and Shelby Township will invest \$357,500 to

cover the remaining costs. Bryan Santo, director of the Macomb County Department of Roads, said that the proposed plans will make dual left turn lanes from eastbound 23 Mile to northbound Shelby Parkway.

A 76-year-old Lenox Township woman was temporarily trapped inside of her SUV after running a red light and colliding with another vehicle in Richmond July 31. The driver of the SUV, a 2018 Chevy Equinox, ran a red light at Main Street and Gratiot Avenue at about 4:30 p.m. The vehicle collided with a 2007 Ford Fusion driven by a 66-year-old Richmond woman. The SUV spun around and rolled onto its driver's side, police said. The Lenox Township woman was extricated by Richmond firefighters and transported to the hospital by Richmond-Lenox EMS.



OAKLAND TOWNSHIP Veterans Tribute memorial dedicated

Rainy weather didn't dampen the spirits of the hundreds of people who attended the Veterans Tribute of Oakland Township dedication ceremony July 31.

After two years of planning, fundraising, and working with the Oakland Township Board of Trustees and developer Dominic Moceri, all the hard work came to fruition.

Boy Scouts and Eagle Scouts from Troop 125 of Rochester Hills volunteered with setup, directing traffic, assisting seniors and veterans and cleanup. They also lead the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Military vehicles were on display, a food truck from Bigalora offered pizza, tiramisu and gelato, and the Rochester Hills Fire Department had two ladder trucks form an arch at the memorial entrance with an American flag suspended from the center.

Musical highlights included trumpeter Carlos Perez-Hijar, who played Reveille, patriotic music was performed by the Rochester Adams High School Marching Band, and Brandy Hewines, a recent graduate of Rochester Adams, sang the National Anthem and "God Bless America".

Tim Reese, who spearheaded the memorial project since the beginning, served as master of ceremonies.

"Thank you all for coming out tonight and braving the weather. You're our heroes," he said.

Originally a World War II B-17 bomber was set to do a flyover during the ceremony, but the poor weather conditions prevented this from happening. Two F-16 Vipers from the 180th Fighter Wing in Toledo did fly over Oakland Township near the end of the ceremony.

Terry Gonser thanked all of the sponsors for their generous donations to the memorial.

The group had originally set a goal

"On behalf of the Board of Directors I express our sincerest thanks to all the patriots who made this outstanding tribute come to life. May it serve for many, many generations to come," he said.

Moceri, who also donated the land for the project, said the memorial had tremendous significance for him as members of his family have served in the Merchant Marines. His son Dominico enlisted in the Marine Corps this year.

"I said, 'Nico, why are you joining the Marines?' He said 'Why isn't everybody? The best honor I can bestow on my family, the greatest is to wear the uniform, to defend our country, and defend the freedoms of the world," Moceri said.

WJR radio personality Frank Beckmann served as guest speaker at the dedication. He asked the veterans in attendance if the rainy weather at the dedication was worse than conditions they faced on the battlefront. "No way," they responded.

"This is our community coming together to offer as best we can our thanks to the men and women of our military who have served our country so greatly," Beckmann said. "We can only say two very special words from the bottom of our hearts: Thank you. Thank you for what you have done."

David Sokol also announced future plans for the tribute.


"Our next steps are to make sure we have a maintenance fund endowed to keep this thing beautiful for generations to come and we're going to begin raising another \$300,000 to \$400,000 to make that happen," he said.

Sokol encouraged attendees to volunteer to help maintain the tribute, to serve on the Flag Honor Guard, which raises and lowers the flag at half mast, and to host private fundraisers.

"We welcome your support and we need it to keep going in our community and make sure it remains successful," he said.






